My brothers and sisters in the Lord,

We gather today as a faith community and remember the visit of wise men, the Magi, to the family of Nazareth. Our Nativity scenes at home and in church recreate, in a way, what took place that day when these visitors from the East made their appearance and came with gifts to offer to the Christ Child. As we gaze upon the scene of Mary, Joseph, the Christ Child, the shepherds and now the Magi, it truly can be an inspirational moment and one that adults and children have viewed for centuries. However, we can never forget the true significance of this visit by strangers from the East.

The coming of the Magi is found only in the Gospel of Matthew. It is not mentioned in any other Gospel. There is a significant reason for that.

Matthew was writing his Gospel for a Christian community that composed mainly of Christians who were converted from Judaism. As such, it was their belief at that time that the Messiah would come for the salvation of the Chosen People, the community of Israel. Since they were still novices in this new religion called Christianity, they had not yet come to fully understand the significant of the birth of the Son of God, that he came into the world to save all people.

The invitation from God to the Magi, who were Gentiles (people did not profess faith in the one God of the people of Israel), proclaimed loud and clear that the salvation offered by the Lord was not restricted only to the Chosen People, but was universal. People of all faiths, of all backgrounds, of all cultural origins, of all strata in society were able to be saved by the coming of the Lord Jesus. A similar invitation had been given to the shepherds on the night of Christ's birth. Again, this announcement to those who tended their flocks by night also had significance regarding who Jesus is and what his mission to the world would be.

Like the Magi, the shepherds were on the fringes of the circle of salvation and there were significant reasons for that. They were 1) poor and thus despised by the self-righteous; 2) they were considered unreligious since they did not, or rather could not, observe religious rituals since they could not leave their flocks untended, and 3) they were considered unclean since they came in contact with blood, especially at the birthing of lambs, and contact with blood was contrary to the law.

Yet, similar to the Magi, the invitation to come and adore and to rejoice in this birth was not extended to the politically and religiously and economically correct in the society of that day. The invitation was offered to those who were on the fringes of the circle of salvation and, therefore, considered by the self-righteous to be beyond the scope of being saved.

Jesus would continue as an adult to touch those who were despised and looked down upon by others: the sick, sinners, tax collectors, foreigners. It seems ironically sad that the people to whom Jesus ministered in his time are the same people who are despised by some people today. Clearly, there is still a great need on the part of the disciples of the Lord to do what Jesus did – to minister, to serve, and, most especially, to accept, those who are still despised by many in society today.

The Magi came and offered what they brought to the Christ Child. The question for us to ask ourselves is this – what will we offer to the Lord today? How much of our time, which of our talents, what portion of our treasure will we give to the Lord. We must always remember that whatever we give will be used well by the Lord and by our parish community to continue to proclaim his presence in the world.

Christmas Collection


