

Mission Appeal 2022 (Archdiocese of Imphal, India) This Weekend

The mission Diocese of Imphal in Northeast India is home to 34 tribes of Mongolian origin. The first Catholic baptism in the diocese was recorded in 1952. The Catholic population has grown up to 1, 01283 now. The diocese has 45 parishes, and 8 Mission Centers, 174 priests including 114 indigenous tribal priests. The growth of the Church has always been accompanied by various challenges and persecutions during the past decades. Between1990 – 2001, six of our young and dynamic missionaries were killed for witnessing the gospel.

Besides direct evangelization, the Church is actively involved in the everyday life of the people through other forms of apostolate like education, health care, self-help program, rehabilitation of the sick, drug addicts and the orphans. Much remains to be done for this interior and underdeveloped region through your participation and generous support.

In spite of the many challenges, missionary efforts are yielding an increase in vocation to priesthood and religious life. The proceeds of the 2022 Mission appeal will be used for providing food, safe drinking water facilities, primary education of tribal girls and health care for the rural tribal population in the newly established parish of St. John in Nungba.

Thank you for your generous support for the implementation of this humanitarian project. Thank you Rev. Jose Manjakunnel for representing archdiocese of Imphal and for speaking at all masses.


